







The Final Tally: Michigan Picks Biden and Peters

If the election for US Senate was held today, and the candidates were Democrat Gary Peters, Republican John James, and Green Party candidate Marcia Squier, who would you vote for?








McCormack, Welch in favorable position

Justice of the Supreme Court Bridget Mary McCormack




And working from the same list of choices, who would be your second choice for Michigan Supreme Court?










That Woman from Michigan Held in Higher Regard than Trump



Who do you think has done a better job handling the Coronavirus: Governor Whitmer, or President Trump?








Count Every Vote

But an overwhelming majority of people agree that every vote should be counted regardless of how long clerks take to deliver results.
