Q14 In addition to finding no evidence of widespread or systematic fraud in Michigan’s 2020 election, the Republican-led Michigan Senate Oversight Committee’s report also recommended that the attorney general consider opening a criminal investigation into “those who have been utilizing misleading and false information about [conspiracy theories surrounding] Antrim County to raise money or publicity for their own ends.” Does hearing this make you more likely or less likely to support a candidate for public office who supported claims of widespread and systematic fraud in Michigan’s 2020 election, or does it not make a difference?
