







Respondents Reject GOP Election Bills






Michigan Takes COVID-19 Seriously






Michigan Says Tax the Rich to Pay for Infrastructure


President Biden's American Jobs Plan is intended to address infrastructure, climate change, and job creation. How familiar are you with the specifics of the American Jobs Plan: very familiar, somewhat familiar, not too familiar, or not familiar at all?



Specifics of President Biden's American Jobs Plan include fixing America's roads, bridges, and ports; rebuilding drinking water infrastructure and renewing our electric grid; and creating caregiving jobs and raising wages and benefits for essential home care workers. Does hearing these specifics make you more likely or less likely to support the American Jobs Plan, or does it not make a difference?






Education Officials Make Difference in Voucher Veto Opinion

Recently, in a move the public was largely unaware of, Governor Whitmer vetoed a line item in the education budget that would have given Grand Valley State University \$155 million for student literacy programs. Despite the following GOP attempts to paint Whitmer as against teaching kids to read, when Respondents learned more about the issue, they agreed with Whitmer.

Recently, Governor Whitmer approved a \$17 billion education budget but vetoed a Republican-backed proposal to give \$155 million to Grand Valley State University to provide grants for tutoring, after-school programs, or summer school programs to young students struggling with reading. Based on what you know, do you support or oppose Governor Whitmer's veto of the \$155 million to Grand Valley State University, or are you not sure?



Betsy DeVos and Republican lawmakers have criticized Governor Whitmer's decision to veto the proposal to give Grand Valley State University \$155 million for reading grants for students, but the Michigan Association of School Boards and the Michigan Association of Superintendents and Administrators encouraged the Governor to veto the proposal, saying the \$155 million would be better spent going directly to schools. Does hearing this make you more likely or less likely to support the Governor's decision to veto the proposal, or does it not make a difference?

Former Detroit Police Chief James Craig recently announced he formed an exploratory committee to run for Michigan's governor.
