




Majority Oppose GOP Ballot Initiative to Change Voting Laws








Michiganders Support National Popular Vote for Presidential Elections

Currently the presidency is awarded to the candidate who wins the majority of the Electoral College votes, but the majority of respondents support changing that to the winner of the national popular vote. Possible Government Shutdown on GOP's Shoulders

While the yearly debate over the federal budget and the debt ceiling has been kicked down the road a couple months, a slim majority of Michiganders will blame Republicans if the government shuts down and defaults on its loans. Senate Republicans in Congress have blocked a House-passed bill that would fund the federal government and suspend the U.S. debt ceiling, which gives the government permission to borrow more money to pay off its existing debts. This bill would prevent the U.S. government from shutting down and defaulting on its loans. If the federal government shuts down and defaults on its loan payments, would you blame Republicans more, blame Democrats more, or would you blame both parties?
