


# Overwhelming Support for Protecting Abortion Access The majority of respondents oppose lawmakers deciding when a person should get an abortion, and want Michiganders to vote on enshrining abortion access in the state Constitution.

I'm going to give you two statements, and then ask which one comes closer to your view. Here's the first statement: whether or not to get an abortion is a decision that should be made between a patient and a doctor. Here's the second statement: lawmakers should decide if and when a person can get an abortion. Which do you agree with more?



A ballot initiative that will add reproductive health rights, including abortion access, to Michigan's constitution may soon be added to the November 2022 election ballot. Regardless of your opinion on abortion, do you believe Michiganders should have the opportunity to vote on this ballot initiative or not?









# Respondents Oppose Using Taxpayer Money to Defend MI Abortion Ban

Not only do Michiganders oppose GOP lawmakers using taxpayer money to defend the 1931 abortion ban, they support efforts to abolish the ban altogether. Now that Roe v. Wade has been overturned, a 1931 Michigan law will make abortion illegal including in cases of rape and incest pending a lawsuit challenging the ban. Do you support or oppose efforts to repeal this law and keep abortion legal in Michigan?



The Republican-led State House and Senate have spent over \$70,000 of taxpayer money on legal services in defense of Michigan's 1931 abortion ban, which is currently tied up in lawsuits. Do you support or oppose Republican lawmakers using taxpayer money to defend Michigan's 1931 abortion ban?









Michiganders Still



Majority Support Whitmer Child Care Bill

Whitmer recently signed eight bills into law to support and expand affordable child care and Michiganders support her efforts.

One year ago, Governor Whitmer announced a \$1.4 billion plan to expand affordable child care options using federal funds. One month ago, she signed eight bills into law to help existing child care centers stay open, new centers to open, and expanded eligibility for families who need financial assistance to afford child care. Do you support or oppose Governor Whitmer signing these child care bills into law?

Voters Concerned About Conservative Supreme Court

The recent overturning of Roe v. Wade has voters concerned about losing other rights.

Recently, the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade, which protected the right to an abortion. In the wake of this decision, are you very concerned, somewhat concerned, not very concerned, or not at all concerned about losing other rights such as the right to birth control, same-sex marriage, and interracial marriage?
