New Poll: Michiganders Concerned About Project 2025

Polling digs into public opinion about campaign finance, MI Supreme Court, and more

MICHIGAN - On Tuesday, Progress Michigan released the latest edition of Lake Effect, a monthly poll that tracks public opinion about a variety of issues and political figures. This month's edition investigates how Michiganders feel about campaign finance laws, Project 2025, and universal background checks.

"Project 2025 is a dangerous, authoritarian playbook drawn up by a corporate-backed, right-wing think tank that threatens freedom and communities across the country —and it turns out the people of Michigan agree," said Sam Inglot, executive director of Progress Michigan. "Michiganders are also deeply concerned about the corrupting influence of corporate money in politics, and they want real action to address it. Meanwhile, people across the state are feeling good about the Biden administration's recent move to require background checks for all firearm purchases, because we know that evidence-based policies like this will make us all safer. And, while Michigan Supreme Court elections' place on the ballot can sometimes lead to voter roll off, Michiganders understand that the court is a big deal that affects all of our lives."

Additional results are available below. Some key takeaways include:

- 67% of respondents support banning political contributions from regulated monopolies and corporations with state contracts. When respondents were given more information about how utility companies in particular impact the political process, that number jumped to 76%.
- 90% of those polled believe that voting for the Michigan Supreme Court is important.
 Only 6% said they view these elections as unimportant.
- 69% of respondents support recent action taken by the Biden administration to require background checks for all firearm purchases, while only 26% oppose the policy.
- Initially, a staggering 65% of those polled said they were unsure whether they approved
 or disapproved of Project 2025. But when given basic information about MAGA
 Republicans' Project 2025 agenda, 59% of said they oppose the agenda, while just 28%
 support it and 13% are unsure.

	Some recent decisions made by the Michigan State Supreme Court include ruling that the 2022 reproductive freedom ballot initiative would go to voters after Republican attempts to block it and ruling the state's anti-discrimination laws also cover sexual orientation, which expanded legal protections for the LGBTQ community. This year they are also weighing in on the 2018 ballot initiative that would have raised the state's minimum wage to \$12 if not for Republican lawmakers stopping it from going to the ballot.
